## **Reflexive and Intensive Pronouns**

What are they?	<b>Reflexive pronouns</b>	Intensive pronouns
Reflexive and intensive pronouns are made by adding: SELF (for one person) or SELVES (for more than one) to a personal pronoun like "He" or "they."	These pronouns reflect back to the subject of the sentence. ex: The woman tried to convince herself that she didn't need a wig	These pronouns add emphasis to a sentence but aren't necessary for the sentence to make sense. Ex: The man held the door for his daughter himself.
	Explanation: Herself shows that the woman is doing something to herself. (myself, yourself, himself, herself, itself, ourselves, yourselves, themselves)	Explanation: Himself emphasizes that the man, and no one else, held the door. (myself, yourself, himself, herself, itself, ourselves, yourselves, themselves)

**How to Tell the Difference:** To determine if a pronoun is reflexive or intensive, try reading the sentence without the pronoun ending in –self or –selves. If the sentence still makes sense without it, the pronoun is **intensive**.

### **Proper Adjectives**

Proper adjectives are adjectives derived from proper nouns. They typically describe something that originates from a specific place, person, or thing and are usually capitalized because they come from proper nouns.

#### Ex:

- Italian food (derived from the proper noun "Italy")
- Shakespearean drama (derived from the proper noun "Shakespeare")
- Victorian architecture (derived from the proper noun "Victoria")

#### **Remember:**

- Proper adjectives always begin with a capital letter.
- They modify nouns and provide more specific information about the noun by linking it to a particular proper noun.
