



Scavenger Hunt Items

1. Find an example of a title from a magazine article that uses proper capitalization for all the important words. Cut it out and glue it to your poster.
(e.g., “The Future of Technology”)
2. Look for a sentence in a newspaper that has someone speaking. Cut it out and glue it to your poster, ensuring quotation marks and capital letters are correct.
(e.g., “We are excited to open the new school,” said the principal.)
3. Search for a headline on a website. Print it out and glue it to your poster, ensuring the title uses capital letters for important words.
(e.g., “New Discoveries in Space Travel”)
4. Ask a friend to say a sentence aloud that includes a direct quote. Write it down, making sure to use quotation marks and capital letters correctly.
(e.g., Your friend says, “I love playing soccer,” and you write it down with proper punctuation.)
5. Look for a sentence in a news article where someone is giving advice. Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster. Make sure it includes quotation marks and capital letters.
(e.g., “You should always wear a helmet,” said the safety officer.)
6. Find a logo of a brand or company with words in it. Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster. Make sure the logo uses proper capital letters.
(e.g., “Nike” or “Google”)
7. Find a slogan from a magazine or website. Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster. Make sure to capitalize the important words in the slogan.
(e.g., “Just Do It” or “Taste the Feeling”)
8. Look for a headline in a newspaper or on a website that includes a question. Cut it out or print it, and glue it to your poster. Ensure the capital letters for important words are correct.
(e.g., “Will We Ever Visit Mars?”)
9. Find a conversation in a magazine or newspaper where two people are talking. Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster, making sure quotation marks and capital letters are used properly.
(e.g., “We need more time,” said the engineer. “We’ll finish by Friday,” replied the manager.)
10. Search for a headline from a magazine that has more than four words. Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster. Make sure it has the correct capital letters.
(e.g., “New Research Reveals Ancient Secrets”)

- 11.** Find a sentence from an online article or magazine where someone is asking for help. Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster. Ensure proper use of quotation marks and capitalization.
(e.g., “Can you help me with this project?” asked the student.)
- 12.** Search for a title from a website or magazine with more than three words. Cut it out or print it, ensuring the title uses capital letters for important words.
(e.g., “Breaking News: Firefighters Save Family”)
- 13.** Look for a slogan that uses alliteration (repetition of the same sound at the start of words). Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster. Make sure it uses proper capital letters.
(e.g., “Finger Lickin’ Good”)
- 14.** Find a slogan or tagline from a brand logo. Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster, making sure to capitalize the important words.
(e.g., “Open Happiness” from Coca-Cola)
- 15.** Look for a news headline from a magazine or website that starts with a question word (*Who, What, When, Where, Why, or How*). Cut it out or print it, and glue it to your poster.
(e.g., “How Does Solar Energy Work?”)
- 16.** Find a conversation in an article where someone is explaining how to do something. Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster. Make sure the quotation marks and capital letters are correct.
(e.g., “To access the database, click here,” explained the technician.)
- 17.** Find a logo or slogan that includes a proper noun (brand name or person’s name). Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster, ensuring proper capitalization.
(e.g., “McDonald’s” or “Apple”)
- 18.** Find a headline from a newspaper or website that includes a brand name. Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster. Make sure the brand name uses capital letters.
(e.g., “Tesla Unveils New Electric Truck”)
- 19.** Look for a headline that includes two or more names. Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster. Ensure proper capitalization.
(e.g., “Elon Musk and Jeff Bezos Compete in Space Race”)
- 20.** Find a title of a website article that includes a colon (:). Cut it out or print it and glue it to your poster, ensuring proper capitalization.
(e.g., “The Future of Technology: What to Expect”)
